


### **MISSION**

Partner with California businesses to create and retain high wage jobs while providing workers the opportunity to train for career advancement.

#### **VISION**

To be the premier resource for workforce training leading to high wages and career progression with a focus on diversity, equity, and inclusion.





#### A BRIEF HISTORY

The Employment Training Panel (ETP) is a statewide business-labor training and economic development program. The program supports the California economy by funding training to ensure employers have skilled workers to compete globally. ETP funded training supports the creation and retention of high-wage, high-skilled, secure jobs in industries that positively impacts California's economy.

ETP is governed by an eight-member panel: three Governor appointees, two Speaker of the Assembly appointees, two Senate Pro Tempore appointees, and an ex-officio member representing the Governor's Office of Business and Economic Development (GO-Biz). Panel members represent the interests of labor, employers, and the public. The Panel meets regularly to review and approve training contracts in accordance with statutory standards for eligibility and performance.

ETP was created in 1982 mandated to address the large displacement of workers due to a series of plant closures by moving the unemployed quickly into jobs and saving jobs of workers threatened with displacement. The program has expanded to benefit the overall California economy. The Panel continues to operate under its initial legislative mandate to promote a healthy labor market with an emphasis on helping businesses overcome the challenges of out-of-state and international competition.

The Panel's success is due to the programs ability to immediately respond to economic changes and workforce needs. For over three decades, the Panel has supported California's workers and employers, providing approximately \$1.9 billion for the successful training and employment retention of 1.5 million workers employed by over 96,272 California businesses.



# DIVERSITY, EQUITY & INCLUSION



ETP has doubled down its efforts on diversity, equity and inclusion in the workforce. Since launching the Apprenticeship Pilot program in 2012, large industries such as construction and manufacturing have been inherently male dominated, leaving counterparts trailing behind.

ETP seeks to make improvements on providing inclusive and equitable opportunities for underserved populations through on-going data analysis and measurement, exploring non-traditional apprenticeship pathways for minorities to build meaningful careers and creating policy that breaks down barriers and provides more opportunities for advancement.


ETP's efforts include staff workgroup formation to solicit recommendations, and discussion with Panel members regarding concrete and significant actions that can be taken, including new marketing efforts, encouraging or placing requirements on contractors, or creating a new Pilot program to incentivize proposals.

The ETP also provided essential resources for small businesses who may not have the ability to provide training to their workers. During the 2021–22 fiscal year, small businesses made up 73 percent of the core funded contracts. ETP's Small Business Program provides higher training reimbursement rates for businesses with 100 or fewer employees in California. Small Businesses can contract directly with ETP or participate in a Multiple Employer Contract (MEC), reducing the employers' cost of administration.

# ETP FUNDING CORE PROGRAM FUNDING



ETP's core program is funded by the Employment Training Tax (ETT), paid by California companies participating in the Unemployment Insurance system, to promote the development of California workers. ETT revenues are deposited in the Employment Training Fund (ETF), established to fund ETP and training programs approved by Panel. ETP does not use Federal or State General Funds.

### ALTERNATIVE FUNDING

ETP uses alternative funding to support unique policy initiatives and reach public sector employers. ETP receives alternative funding from the California Energy Commission. Additionally, the Clean Transportation Program (CTP), formerly known as the Alternative and Renewable Fuel and Vehicle Technology Program (ARFVTP) was created in FY 2009-10 under AB 118 to provide workforce training in alternative fuels and vehicle technologies.

The Panel targets training for workers in regions of the State with lagging economies and unemployment rates higher than the state average. During the 2021-22 fiscal year, \$5 million was approved for training in high unemployment areas, providing training for 5,552 workers.

# PROGRAM & PROCESS IMPROVEMENTS

#### **Policy Committee**

ETP's Policy Committee continues to meet with stakeholders to allow greater public participation and understanding in the policy recommendations submitted to the full Panel. In FY 2021–22 the Policy Committee heard and approved the guidelines for two alternate funding streams awarded to ETP for the \$50 million dollar Expansion Fund Program to serve companies in high demand industry sectors and the \$15 million dollar California Community College Fund which focused on partnering with California Community Colleges for the strong workforce program.



#### **Telework**

ETP has formed a telework workgroup comprised of cross-unit staff to work on the best solutions for the future state of teleworking. Upholding ETP's mission while ensuring the health of our staff is the focus of this workgroup. Teleworking will continue to utilize communication technology that includes Microsoft Teams and Zoom.

### **TECHNOLOGY**



#### ETP's Website

ETP's website utilizes a modern interface that is backed by the California Office of Digital Innovation. ETP continues to focus on offering a user-centered, accessible, and mobile-friendly website. Etp.ca.gov serves as a starting point for public users to view important updates, access program information and knowledge, and to access ETP's Cal-E-Force & Cal-E-Grant systems. In addition to these services, our website also offers integrated digital forms. These forms provide a way for public users to request information and submit valuable feedback. ETP is proudly certified to be in compliance with California Government Code Sections 7405 and 11135.

### SYSTEM CONSOLIDATION

ETP completes the migration of nearly 2,300 Legacy contracts to our Cal-E-Force cloud-based contracting system in a joint collaboration spanning our entire department and our consultants. This is a monumental milestone for our department and our stakeholders who now have access to seven years of contracting data in one system. Currently, there are nearly 2,700 contracts in Cal-E-Force, over 10 million different data fields from recently migrated contracts added to Cal-E-Force and 175.6 million points of data transferred overall.

## Contract Management System (Cal-E-Force)

Cal-E-Force has been instrumental in helping ETP become more efficient, responsive, and strategic.

ETP's Cal-E-Force system holds two subcategories: Cal-E-Program for ETP's Core funded program and Cal-E-Grants for ETP and CWDB's Grant funding opportunities.

- Cal-E-Program holds over seven years of Contract Data allowing staff and stakeholders to look at prior contract information and future planning for applications/contracts. Cal-E-Program is continuing to add enhancements to streamline the application process, the internal contract development pieces and print forms for routing and approvals.
- Cal-E-Grants is a shared platform for ETP and CWDB allowing customers to apply to many different grant funding opportunities. This system allows the application process to start online from the beginning and allows agency efficiencies for processing, routing, and report requirements.




#### **Security**

ETP is continuously educating its end users regarding the types of security risks in order to maintain a secure environment. ETP follows the State of California's Cal-Secure Information Security Maturity Roadmap. Cal-Secure outlines innovative information, privacy, and cybersecurity roadmaps that incorporates hundreds of hours of feedback from the state government security community and has several key features. Cal-Secure is broken into three strategic categories - people, process, and technology. Each category contains strategic priorities to address their respective critical shortfalls or concerns. An area of focus this period for ETP will be addressing any findings from ETP's Information Security Program Audit.



# INCENTIVES AND SPECIAL TRAINING PROGRAMS

In response to administrative and legislative priorities, the Panel implements Pilot Programs to test training models that support California's changing workforce needs; including the COVID Pilot Program, Clean Transportation Program, Job Creation, Apprenticeship Training Program, and Veterans Training.



#### JOB CREATION

In the 2021–22 fiscal year, ETP supported job creation, funding projects with demonstrated investment in California's economy, including critical proposals developed in conjunction with GO-Biz. The Panel also prioritized projects developed under the "Retrainee – Job Creation" guidelines, which demonstrated a strong link to job creation and business expansion, including employer's investment in new workers, expanded or new facilities, new equipment, or other measurable investments in hiring of workers and expansion of California's workforce.



Social Entrepreneurs for Economic Development (SEED) Initiative supports the entrepreneurship of immigrants and limited English proficient (LEP) individuals by providing micro-grants, entrepreneurial training, and technical assistance to support them in starting or maintaining a small business in California aimed at addressing a social problem or meeting a community need. SEED helps to increase California's economic diversity and spurs business innovation. ETP works closely with select non-profit Community Based Organizations who develop and implement SEED program components. The SEED Initiative helps to support entrepreneurship in target industries that are vital to California's growth while also supporting equality and the Governor's initiatives. The SEED Initiative also supports and increases the number of new small businesses in California while also helping to support existing immigrant/LEP owned small businesses throughout the state.

### PAID FAMILY LEAVE (PFL)



The Paid Family Leave (PFL) program allows California workers to take paid leave to bond with a new child or to care for a seriously ill family member. PFL pays up to 8 weeks of benefits in a 12-month period. Although PFL does not provide job protection, there are various federal and state laws that provide protected leave for up to 12 weeks. ETP has been designated to administrate \$1,000,000 in California State General Fund dollars to support California small businesses impacted by the Paid Family Leave Program. This will help to offset the costs incurred when training employees to cover the duties of the individual utilizing PFL.

Businesses that are impacted by the PFL program will have increased costs such as training and upskilling existing staff to cover the duties of the employee on PFL, hiring and training additional staff to cover the duties of the employee on PFL, and the marketing, recruitment, and training costs to cover these activities. Each business may receive up to \$1,000 or \$2,000 per employee utilizing PFL. ETP works closely with a few select Multiple Employer groups to provide outreach and grant funds to California small businesses impacted by at least one employee utilizing the Paid Family Leave program.


The California Advanced Supply Chain Analysis and Diversification Effort (CASCADE) is a grant program funded by the U.S. Department of Defense, Office of Economic Adjustment through the California Governor's Office of Planning and Research (OPR). Launched in the fall of 2017, the program aims to bolster California's defense supply chain cybersecurity resilience, innovation capacity and diversification strategies and to support the growth and sustainment of California's cybersecurity workforce through cybersecurity-related education curricula, training, and apprenticeship programs. It includes several funded projects featuring a variety of cybersecurity resilience work, in partnership with a coalition of government agencies and community, industry, and educational institutions. Activities include: cybersecurity workshops, cybersecurity compliance assistance, cybersecurity labor market and skills gap analysis, cybersecurity provider mapping and guidance, cybersecurity for space systems, and cybersecurity-related education curricula, training, and apprenticeship programs.



CASCADE II builds on these activities and bolsters California's defense supply chain resilience through cybersecurity preparedness assistance programs and support for growing and sustaining its cybersecurity workforce. It again incorporates a wide array of partner organizations across 15 individual projects including work on education curricula, training, internship, and apprenticeship programs, and broadening capabilities and reach through train-the-trainer networks.

ETP was recognized for its successful engagement and partnership efforts under CASCADE. Through CASCADE, the Panel has increased the number of ETP training contracts that addressed cybersecurity workforce needs for manufacturing and aerospace contractors within the defense supply chain. ETP also served on the CASCADE Technical Advisory Committee to promote strategic alignment and facilitate additional partnership and contracting opportunities for ETP stakeholders.



Over seven decades later, Villara Corporation sets the standard for excellence in the HVAC trade. President Rick Wylie evolved from a talented engineer and inventor who spearheads the drive for new and better products, to the president of the company. Under his guidance, Del Beutler's Vision has become the largest heating and air and plumbing company in the United States with locations throughout Northern California.

Villara Corporation is proud to support and participate in initiatives that improve and enhance the communities in which they do business. Over the years, they have supported various programs that have touched the lives of many, especially those who are in great need.

Beutler Heating and Air Conditioning started in the garage of Del Beutler's home in 1947. Del honed his skills as a sheet metal specialist for two years in the U.S. Navy. After spending a year working for a local sheet metal shop, he then went on to obtain his own contractors license.

The first air conditioners were water-cooled, which created massive amounts of spent water and environmental problems. Beutler devised systems, which recycled the water, but the contamination problems seemed insurmountable. Finally, air-cooled systems were introduced and an entire industry was born. Beutler then began working to improve the efficiency of fans, ducting, vents, and insulation. Always developing something new, Del created a think tank atmosphere for his employees.



#### APPROPRIATIONS AND EXPENDITURES

In FY 2021-22, the ETF received a Budget Act appropriation of \$84 million. The FY 2021-22 ETF collection was forecast at \$104.3 million. After deducting administrative costs, and prior year liabilities, ETP had over \$16.7 million to fund new core training contracts in FY 2021-22. The Panel expended all of these training funds by May 2022.

The available \$80.4 million in core funding for Fiscal Year 2021-22 was allocated by the Panel as follows:

- Program Funds: The Panel encumbered all available program funds (\$64.7 million) for training. Of this amount, \$48.0 million was used for prior-year contract liabilities resulting from incremental funding and \$16.7 million was encumbered into new training contracts.
- In order to maximize program funds, ETP incrementally encumbers training funds, initially encumbering about 40 percent of the contract amounts to cover first year costs and mitigate second year liabilities. Funding is disbursed over a two-year term per project.
- Program Administration: Approximately \$15 million was used for program administration costs, including EDD support.
- Marketing and Research: ETP did not have any marketing contracts in fiscal year 2021-22 due to the on-going demand for ETP funds. ETP training contracts did not require a high level of marketing expenditures as in years past.








#### D. TRAINEE WAGES

Among ETP core and alternative funding, the average post retention wage for 628 workers unemployed at the start of training (new hires) was \$19.39 per hour. The average post-retention wage for 75,413 incumbent workers (retrainees) was \$34.60 per hour.

While ETP funds training for high-wage, high-skill jobs, it also funds training for lower wage workers to assist them in advancing to better paying, more secure jobs.

The graph below illustrates the difference in the distribution of trainee wages after training and retention in 2017-18 and 2021-22.




### E. LITERACY TRAINING
